

Xiaobo Lü

Professor Xiaobo Lü is the founding director of Columbia Global Centers | East Asia in Beijing. While in China, he was a visiting professor at Tsinghua University and a lecturer at Peking University. In 1994, Lü joined the faculty of Barnard College at Columbia University, where he teaches courses on Chinese politics, political economy and comparative politics. His research interests include post-socialist transition, corruption and good governance, regulatory reforms and governmentbusiness relations. His latest book is From Player to Referee: The Rise of the Regulatory State in China. He is the author of the book Cadres and Corruption (2000) and co-author of Danwei: Changing Chinese Workplace in Historical and Comparative Perspective (1997). In the book Taxation Without Representation in Contemporary Rural China (2003), Lü and Thomas Bernstein examined political and economic changes in the Chinese countryside. Lü is a member of the Council on Foreign Relations, the Committee of 100 and the National Committee on United States-China Relations.



Amedeo Tumolillo

Amedeo Tumolillo is an award-winning multimedia journalist with years of experience working on editorial teams in Hong Kong and New York for *The New York Times.* While in Asia, he ran the international home page, produced multimedia projects and helped launch a global opinion section. Most recently, Tumolillo handled user experience and multimedia projects for Spectrum, a digital publication of the Simons Foundation that serves autism researchers. He currently oversees SupChina's fastgrowing editorial team, aggregating more than 50 news sources each day about China for a millennial audience. His work has been recognized by the Associated Press, E.W. Scripps and the Knight-Batten Awards for Innovations in Journalism. In 2014, he was part of the team at SFARI.org (now Spectrum) that was honored by The Webby Awards. He holds a master's degree in journalism from Northwestern University and a bachelor's degree in English from the University of Oklahoma.

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Ted Wang

Ted Wang is CIO of Puissance Capital, a hedge fund focused on Chinese and American investments. In 1996, he joined Goldman Sachs, where he became a managing director in 2002, a partner in 2006 and the global cohead of the Delta One trading desk. As the most senior Chinese partner guiding the firm's strategy in China, he established extensive relationships with government officials, regulators, investors and corporate clients. Wang was a member of the Goldman Sachs Risk Committee and navigated many volatile markets. He ran Goldman's global businesses in operations, technology, credit, and legal and compliance. Prior to joining Goldman, Wang cofounded Xeotron Corp., a Texas company specializing in DNA biochips. He holds a Ph.D. in physics from the University of Minnesota, an MBA from the University of Texas, Austin, and a B.S. from Fudan University, China. He is cochair of the board of trustees at the Museum of Chinese in America, a trustee of the China Institute, a board member of the Spence School and a member of the Committee of 100.

Kuo, a native of upstate New York, has lived in Beijing for more than 20 years. While in China, he has cofounded Tang Dynasty, China's most successful metal band; worked as editor of one of China's first online magazines; served as China bureau chief for the technology magazine Red Herring; wrote a column called "Ich Bin Ein Beijinger" for Beijing's most popular English magazine for 10 years; and has been a widely quoted observer and commentator on technology, society, culture and politics. He graduated with a degree in political science from the University of California, Berkeley, and has a master's degree in East Asian studies from the University of Arizona.

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
